

Georgia-Florida Hall of Fame



Congratulations to Mike Fisher (1978-80) and Bill Goldberg (1986-89) who were inducted into the Georgia-Florida Hall of Fame on Friday, November 1, 2024 at the East Club at EverBank Stadium.

MIKE FISHER

Mike Fisher, a walk-on from Jacksonville and Bolles School graduate, went 3-0 against the Gators during his Georgia career. In the 1980 win over Florida, he grabbed two key interceptions. He later secured his fourth interception of the season in the 1981 Sugar Bowl with under 9 minutes remaining, securing a 17-10 victory over Notre Dame and clinching Georgia's national championship.

Fisher started his college career on scholarship at Furman before transferring to Georgia as a walk-on. He earned a scholarship in 1978 and recorded an interception in Georgia's 33-10 win over Florida in 1979. As a starter on the 1980 "Junkyard Dogs" defense, which forced 47 turnovers and had three shutouts, Fisher tallied 39 tackles.

In 1981, he was honored with the McCarthy-Crenshaw Award as UGA's Outstanding Senior Athlete from Florida. After football, Fisher built a successful career as an executive in sales, marketing, and management in the forest products industry.

BILL GOLDBERG

Bill Goldberg, a two-time All-SEC defensive tackle, was a fouryear letterman for the Georgia Bulldogs from 1986 to 1989. He helped Georgia go 3-1 against Florida, including a memorable 26-3 victory in 1988, Vince Dooley's final season. As team captain in 1989, he led the Bulldogs to a 17-10 win over Florida during Ray Goff's first year as head coach. The Tulsa, Oklahoma native still ranks ninth in UGA history with 348 tackles and led the team with 121 tackles as a senior.

Goldberg was drafted by the Los Angeles Rams in 1990 and made his NFL debut with the Atlanta Falcons in 1992 before injuries ended his career. He then found international fame as a professional wrestler, winning multiple championships, including the WCW World Heavyweight Championship, WWE's World Heavyweight Championship, and the WWE Universal Championship, before being inducted into the WWE Hall of Fame in 2018. While continuing to support the Bulldogs, Goldberg has also built a successful career as an actor and commentator, with a new show set to air on Paramount+ in the first quarter of 2025.

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2024 Ole Faithful Dawg Patrick Garbin



The Ole Faithful Dawg Award is given by the Georgia Football Lettermen's Club to an individual who is not a football letterman but who has been a loyal and dedicated supporter of the Bulldog football team. This year's recipient of the Ole Faithful Dawg Award, Patrick Garbin, a historian and Bulldog enthusiast, was a perfect fit. Patrick said writing seven books on the subject of UGA football was a labor of love and getting the books published was quite a task. During Patrick's acceptance speech, he made the statement, "When I was a young teenager all of my buddies would get together on Sunday afternoon in my front yard and play football. We would play hard and even use names of you guys! It's hard to believe I am actually standing here today receiving this award from you guys." The 2024 Ole Faithful Dawg Award was presented to Patrick Garbin on September 7, 2024 at halftime of the UGA vs. Tennessee Tech football game. Patrick wrote an article for us. It is below.



I am deeply honored to be this year's recipient of the Ole Faithful Dawg Award. I am forever grateful to the Georgia Football Lettermen's Club for this honor and for hosting my son and me at its most recent Lettermen's Tailgate. For me, whose heroes growing up were Georgia football players, it was a surreal and unforgettable moment to be surrounded by those who I've always held in such high regard.

My late father, a UGA professor, started taking me to Bulldogs games at Sanford Stadium in 1981. But it was two years later that I became absolutely obsessed with Georgia football. Just prior to the start of the 1983 season, my mother had a chance encounter with her good friend, Debbie Whittemore, wife of Coach Charley Whittemore. Mrs. Whittemore spotted eight-year-old me with my mother and said she had something she'd like to give me at her house. What she gave me—Georgia's 1983 football media guide—would essentially change my world.

For the next year (or until the following year's guide was available), wherever I went, that '83 media guide was likely with me. I repeatedly poured through it, practically memorizing every page. At a very young age, I soon gained a vast knowledge and a tremendous appreciation of Georgia football's great history and tradition—and ultimately due in large part to Mrs. Whittemore giving me that media guide.

That season, Georgia had been given little chance to continue competing at a championship level after the loss of Herschel Walker to the USFL. Still, with a team full of grit, fight, and senior leadership, the Bulldogs were defeated just once while keeping Texas (where the time will always be "10 to 9") from winning a national championship by upsetting the Longhorns in the Cotton Bowl.

While the inspirational 1983 team got me hooked on Georgia football, I've always had the utmost respect and appreciation for all of you gifted enough to represent the University of Georgia on the gridiron. If anyone should be honored for their loyalty and dedication to the Georgia football program, it should be each and every one of you who can proudly wear the "G" as a UGA football letterman. All of you are true inspirations and remain heroes to the program's followers, both young and old.

Thank you again for your kindness and generosity. May God bless you and your families. Go Dawgs!—Patrick Garbin






FEATURED LETTERMAN JIM BAKER (1973-74-75)

Tell us about your background. What brought you to the University of Georgia?

My father was in the military and I lived many different places including 6 years in Germany. When I was in 7th grade in Columbus, GA, I was encouraged to try out for the football team. When I went to sign up, an assistant coach laughed and said, "Baker, you think YOU can play football?" Well, right then and there I decided I'd show him how wrong he was. It was not until my high school years that I came to love the game while playing under Coach Art Williams. His love for football became MY love for football. He was the one who put my name out there for colleges, sent films, made phone calls and made it possible



for me to be recruited by several major universities. I had no preconceived notion of a particular school to attend. I visited several schools, but once I visited Athens and met the Bulldog coaching staff and players and saw the facilities, I knew that this was going to be my new home. Once I made that decision, I never looked back.

Family Information- Please share a little bit of information about your family and be sure to brag on them.

I've been married to my bride, Becky Baker, for 47 ½ years. We have 3 children and all 3 attended UGA at the same time. I was one broke American, but it was worth every penny to see them become Bulldogs. All 3 are married and have given Becky and me 9 grandchildren who are already avid Dawg fans. We are truly blessed that our children live only 30 minutes away from us and we see them often. Our grandchildren range in age from 15 months to 13 years.

You worked at Georgia Crown with Don Leebern for many years. We just presented his grandchildren with the first ever, Truehearted Bulldog Award in his memory. Can you share what Don has meant to you and a story or 2 that represents him?

Don Leebern was one of the finest men I've ever known. I worked for him for almost 50 years, but he was a mix between father, big brother, and friend to me. He was encouraging, supportive and understanding of me in all of my endeavors, whether business or personal. I often witnessed him giving a hand-up to people he knew were in need. It might have been to give them a job, give them a loan, or just give them advice and a pat on the back. He was extremely loyal to those he played ball with both in high school and college. When I first told

him that the Lettermen were going to start an annual tailgate, he said he wanted to be a part of it because the football players had certainly paid their dues, and he loved that we were doing something special for them.

We are so fortunate to have you organize our big tailgate each year. Can you tell us a little bit about how it started and has grown over the years?

Mack Guest and I discussed an annual tailgate for Lettermen 35 years ago. The idea behind the Lettermen Tailgate is to give ALL football lettermen the opportunity to gather and enjoy fellowship with their old friends on Game Day. We started in the playground

of an elementary school across from the practice field with about 25 people. A few years later, we moved to the Coliseum parking lot and our tailgate grew to about 125 people. Once we located to Oconee Cemetery (with the help of Coach Dooley), we just grew and grew. We are now typically serving around 1000 people each tailgate. The best thing about this is that everyone pitches in and makes this a success. We have a group of volunteer chefs that start on Friday and continue Saturday morning putting in 15 plus hours. We have volunteer servers and bartenders that work all day Saturday. This is free to Lettermen and their families as an expression of gratitude and I love every minute of it!

Rumor has it that you were the grand dragon in August of 1975. Can you share that story?

I'm still not sure exactly why I was chosen to be the Grand Dragon, but I took it seriously. This was back in the day when we had "Rat Court" initiation for the freshmen ball players. I was a senior. I felt that I should look mean and tough, so I bought some Red Man chewing tobacco. Let me say that I never had chewed tobacco before and I never will again. It's hard to be big and tough when you are "spinning out" on Red Man. Some of the stories that day need to be kept secret forever. Enough said.

Hobbies, organizations, community involvement, etc.

Besides cooking BBQ, I love to work on my farm in Omaha, GA. I love it when my old football buddies come down for weekends to hunt. I enjoy going deep sea fishing with those guys as well. Coming to Athens, tailgating and going to ball games is definitely one of my favorite things to do. I have several rental properties, and I don't want to be known as a



Slum Lord, so I'm there a lot. Most of my leisure time, however, is spent at ballfields and basketball courts watching my grandchildren participate in sports. I have to admit that we have some pretty good athletes and I have a feeling that we will be watching them for many years to come. Becky and I volunteer at a local mission school and love to be a part of Wake for Warriors on the lake where we live every summer.

What are some of your fondest memories or special moments from your days at UGA?

UGA was one of the best experiences of my life. I cannot put into words what the friendships created there mean to me. I am so glad that we are all still in touch with each other and are continuing to share good times. We love to talk about the "202 Club", the 5th Quarter, the Dog House, Bucky always needing a buck for a beer, shocking times in the locker room, mistaken identity in the whirlpool, Mrs. Johnson in the cafeteria, Coach Copas, fishing with Coach Kasay, 5 AM practice with Coach Kasay on Sunday, butting heads with Coach Russell, wearing Coach Russell's mother's Christmas gift to get into a bar, Bowl game trips, fights that were won and lost, and of course, games that made us look bad, and games that made us look good.

As a supportive member of the Georgia Football Lettermen's Club, what does it mean to you?

I have talked to ballplayers from other colleges and no one has anything like our Lettermen Club. We had a former Auburn quarterback as a tailgate guest a few weeks ago. He was extremely impressed with the cemetery setup and the fact that we were able to be together like we are. He couldn't get over Bulldog Haven! He said AU has nothing like this. We should never take this for granted because it is something special that is years in the making. I appreciate this group beyond measure and hope to be a part of it for many years to come.

This is a fraternity of brothers. We have lost many good ones along the way, but they will always be in our hearts. I find that saying their names out loud every now and then keeps their memories alive. We have shared good times and bad times along the way. We know each other inside and out. We accept each other as we are. What a privilege to have played between the hedges with those who have become some of my very best friends. We are truly unique and I feel blessed and proud to be able to share this brotherhood with men that I love.


The origin of the Red Helmet with the power G's on the side and also the logo seen on flags and decal stickers associated with UGA athletic teams



Old news from a very old Letterman. This season is the 60th Anniversary of future College Football Hall of Fame member Vince Dooley coming to Georgia from Auburn. Before Spring Practice in 1964, he decided to change the football helmet from the traditional plain silver one to something else. I was a fifth-year senior to be. The first day of Spring Practice Mr. Howard Beavers, the Equipment Manager, handed me a white helmet with red and black stripes running front to back, similar to the Auburn helmet which had orange and blue stripes running front to back. I was to wear the helmet throughout Spring Practice and the G Day Game. Everyone else wore the silver helmets. My teammates were not happy. They didn't like the idea of being "Auburn East" or the Gaburn War Dogs".

When we came back in the fall, the helmet design was what you see Georgia wear today. The first game in the new helmets didn't turn out well. We lost by 4 touchdowns in a night game over in Tuscaloosa. Coach Dooley said that, despite the score, we didn't play that badly and he thought we could still have a good season. Based on our play in that game, Wayne Swinford, who went on to play defensive back for the San Francisco 49ers, and I were chosen to be co-captains for the next game on Saturday night in Nashville. We beat Vanderbilt, and that was the first of many wins for Coach Dooley and the new red helmet.

Years later, I asked Coach Dooley if the Green Bay Packers had a copyright or patent on the G design. He said they didn't. But they called up there to see if the Packers minded their logo being copied. Green Bay said it was fine with them if Georgia used it.







Victory at Texas One of Georgia's All-Time Classics

It was a relatively short flight of an hour and 45 minutes home from Austin for the Georgia football team last Saturday night. With a competent police escort on the ground and a tailwind pushing the Delta jet that brought the victors to Ben Epps Field, it was, nonetheless, a night owl flight that touched down only a couple hours before twilight.

I walked into my house at 4:20 a.m., beleaguered and physically spent, but all that was trumped by reverberating euphoria. Classic victories stimulate adrenalin flow — even for geezers — and you can't wait for Sunday morning's SportsCenter and the replays that make you want to sing your favorite fight song, "Glory, Glory."

In another day, a lesser technological era, daybreak's morning papers would have had flowing tributes and photo spreads that would have warmed the cockles of alumni hearts.

How is it that in this day when everything is instant from coffee to a drone disrupting a terrorist's trip to a hideout that we can't get the sports columnists printed take on a signature triumph until two days later?

Athens was very quiet and sound asleep when the Bulldogs scrambled to their quarters with the penultimate satisfaction of a job well done. The thunder of applause will be delayed until the Florida game in Jacksonville. With the team, it was back to work on Monday. Unfinished business remains. The preparation that is always cutting edge with the coach, the Smart man in charge, will be accompanied with reminders that pitfalls await the mentally unprepared on football Saturdays.

Soon there was a note from Claude Felton which read: "Might be the best regular season victory I can recall." That caused rambling reflection.

My first flashback connected me with 1965 when Georgia defeated Michigan at Ann Arbor, 15-7.

As the advance representative, managing team travel arrangements for the Bulldogs, I arrived at Ann Arbor where Michigan was the defending Rose Bowl champion. The attitude was like, "Who is this high school we are playing this week?"

"What conference do you guys play in?" asked the man behind the desk at our team hotel in Ypsilanti, 12 miles away. "How big is your stadium?" was the next question, as he smirked with knowledge that, even in the Big Ten, not many stadiums could match the Wolverines' 105,000 seats. It was obvious that Michigan partisans considered Georgia to be in the "Little Leagues." When the game was over, however, it was a different story.

When the Michigan game of almost six decades is recalled, one interesting sidebar is that there has never been a greater reception for a victorious team returning to Athens. Folks back home in the Classic City had listened to Ed Thilenius call the game, which was over by 5 p.m. Ann Arbor is in the Eastern Time zone and the Bulldogs flew two Southern Airways Martin 404s, stopping in Memphis, as I recall, for refueling. We probably reached Athens around 11 p.m.

As the planes banked to land from the east, we could see headlights in bumper to bumper traffic all the way from the airport to downtown Athens. In the history of UGA football there has never been a greater reception for a returning team.

Considering all factors, the erudite Mr. Felton is probably right about the results last weekend in Austin: sterling victory against the No.1 team in the country before a record crowd of 105,215 and a move to a No. 2 ranking in the polls.

It had to be head turning in 1927 when UGA defeated Yale in New Haven, 14-10; beating Texas 10-9 in the Cotton Bowl in 1984 remains a memorable victory for the Dawgs and so was edging Notre Dame at South Bend, 20-19 in 2017.

The good news for the fans is that with an open date on the schedule, there will be two weeks to enjoy the celebratory highlights of the last game.

It was Georgia's best played game since Clemson and should mollify most doubters.

Fortunately for Georgia, the Bulldogs have a coach who started de-focusing on the Texas victory as soon as he turned in for the night. That is no small thing in his business.


